Colorado Blue Spruce (*Picea pungens* ‘*glauca*’) is a majestic evergreen when planted as a specimen tree or as a group. It is native to North America and is found in USDA growing zones 1 through 7. The blue spruce has blue-green colored needles and is a coniferous tree.



White Pine (*Pinus strobus*) Lake States – Fast growing with soft, green-blue needles, 4” long. Prefers moderate drained soils, tolerates more shade than other pines. Excellent for windbreaks, sound barriers. Grows 80’ to 100’.



American Hazelnut (*Corylus americana*) work best in more natural landscape styles where they will have room to grow. They provide a great mid-height layer to transition from the edge of your yard to the woods beyond and to provide food and shelter for birds and other wildlife.

Hardy to zone 4, **American Hazelnut** is native in the Adirondacks as well as much of the east coast.

Downy serviceberry (*Amelanchier arborea*) is an early-flowering, large shrub or small tree which typically grows 15-25' tall in cultivation. Its early summer fruits are relished by birds and mammals, while the thick canopy is a frequent nesting site for small birds. Serviceberry can be grown in full sun but does best with some late afternoon shade.



The **Redbud (*Cercis canadensis*)** grows from 20 to 30 feet tall and wide at maturity. This tree grows at a fast rate of about 2 feet per year under ideal conditions. The **Eastern Redbud** is a stunning spring bloomer that is native to North America. These trees grow well in full sun or part shade. However, you will get the heaviest blooming from trees in full sun.

River Birch (*Betula nigra*) is a fast-growing, deciduous semi-aquatic tree that reaches between 50 and 90 feet in height. River birch grows under full sun to full shade in highly acidic to slightly alkaline loam, clay, or sand. The river birch tree often is used for landscaping due to its graceful drooping limbs and attractive color.



Silky dogwood (*Comus amomum*) is a large to medium-sized native shrub with creamy white spring flowers, dark green foliage, and reddish stems and burgundy fall color. It has a medium growth rate and on the average is about 10 ft tall and wide at maturity. It will survive in wetter areas where most other shrubs would not survive.

The White Oak (*Quercus alba*) tree is a long-lived tree used for shade in landscapes and it is one of the most important timber species in the United States. The average tree of this species grows between 80 and 100 feet high. This is a slow-growth tree, and its fruit is used by a wide array of birds and mammals.
